Why become a church member?

It identifies you as a genuine believer.

- *"…you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God."* **Ephesians 2:19**
- "...so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another." **Romans 12:5**

The New Testament word for church is *ekklesia*. It means, "the called out ones." It consists of those who have been called out to follow Jesus. Christ is committed to the local church and so should those who follow Him. The church should consist of those who are genuine believers, and every believer should unite with a local church.

It provides a spiritual <u>family</u> to support and encourage you in your walk with Christ.

"And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." **Hebrews 10:24-5**

Membership is an unselfish decision. The difference between belonging and attending is like the difference between being married and cohabitation. Membership can be summed up in a word: **commitment**. We live in an age where very few are willing to be committed to anything; therefore, membership swims against the current of America's "consumer religion."

It gives you a place to discover and use your <u>spiritual gifts</u> in ministry.

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone." **1 Corinthians 12:4-6**

It places you under the spiritual protection of godly leaders.

"Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account." **Hebrews 13:17a**

God gives the church spiritual leaders who are responsible for equipping the members to do the work of the ministry (**Ephesians 4:11-12**). These leaders have as their primary responsibility the study and teaching of the Bible. They are also required to lead the effort to reach others with the good news of God's salvation and oversee the entire scope of the church's work.

It gives you the <u>accountability</u> you need in order to grow.

"...submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ." Ephesians 5:21

The New Testament places a major emphasis on the need for Christians to be accountable to each other for spiritual growth. You cannot be accountable when you are not committed to any specific church family. There are 30 commands in the bible that one cannot fulfill unless they are attached to a local body of believers.

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Sharing Your Faith

The Method of Baptism

Baptizo: to dip/lower beneath the water; To plunge, dip, or immerse; To sink, drench or overwhelm.

It requires...

Water: "I indeed baptized you with water." Mark 1:8a

- **Much water**: "John also was baptizing in Aenon near Salim, because there was much water there..." John 3:23
- **Going into water**: "And he commanded the chariot to stop, and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him." Acts 8:38
- **Being buried beneath the water**: *"Buried with Him in baptism, in which you also were raised with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead."* **Romans 6:4**
- **Coming up out of the water**: *"When He had been baptized, Jesus came up immediately from the water..."* **Romans 6:4**

Our Affiliations

A church technically becomes a Southern Baptist church by contributing to the mission causes of the **Southern Baptist Convention** (SBC). If that contribution is made with in the fiscal year (October-September) preceding a particular annual meeting (June), then the church is entitled to send as many as ten messengers to the annual convention meeting. Though a church may be an SBC church without affiliating with a state convention or local association of SBC churches, it is customary to participate in all three. There are currently 42 conventions and fellowships and more than 1,200 local associations. Each has its particular ministries, fellowship, and mission outreach, and there is a great deal of cooperation among them.

We also cooperate with the: North Carolina Baptist State Convention

Finally, we are affiliated with the: Southern Baptist Convention

Technically, the SBC exists for only two days a year, at the annual gathering. The rest of the year, denominational entities carry out the instructions of the messengers to the convention. The authority, then, resides with the messengers elected by churches and participating in the two-day meeting. Still, those churches and individuals who identify with this enterprise typically call themselves Southern Baptist.

The Cooperative Program (CP) is an agreement among SBC churches, state conventions and fellowships, local associations, and the SBC to work together in Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20) ministries.



A Brief History of Southern Baptists

Early origins

Baptists in America first came from England to New England. The first Baptist church in America was founded in 1639 in Rhode Island. Baptists first arrived in the southern United States near the end of the 17th century in Charleston, S.C. The zealous evangelism of the Separate Baptists was the chief instrument of spreading the Baptist denomination throughout the southern US. In 1814, 33 delegates "from missionary societies and other religious bodies of Baptists in America" met in Philadelphia and formed the first national Baptist organization. This was better known as the "Baptist Board of Foreign Missions" or the "Triennial Convention," since the convention met every three years. The seat of operations was first Philadelphia, then Washington, D.C., and Boston after 1826.

Birth Pains

It is evident that Baptists, both north and south, preferred different types of denominational organization: the Baptists in the north as a whole preferred a loosely structured society composed of individuals who paid annual dues, with each society usually focused on a single ministry, while the southern churches preferred an organization composed of churches patterned after their associations, with a variety of ministries brought under the direction of one denominational organization. Baptists from the South subsequently broke from the national organizations and formed a new convention, the Southern Baptist Convention, which was formed May 8–12, 1845, in Augusta, Ga. Its first president was William Bullein Johnson (1782-1862), who was president of the Triennial Convention in 1841. The consequences of this decision have been long lived.

A survey by the Home Mission Board in 1968 showed that only 11 percent of Southern Baptist churches would admit Americans of African descent. The Southern Baptist Convention of 1995 voted June 20 to adopt a resolution renouncing its racist roots and apologizing for its past defense of slavery. The racism resolution marked the denomination's first formal acknowledgment that racism played a role in its founding. Today there are many diverse and even self-consciously ethnic churches within the convention.

Affiliated Organizations

The Southern Baptist Convention was organized in 1845 primarily for the purpose of creating a mission board to support the sending of Baptist missionaries. The North American Mission Board (NAMB)—originally founded as the Domestic Mission Board, and later the Home Mission Board in Alpharetta, Ga., serves missionaries involved in evangelism and church planting in the US and Canada, while the International Mission Board (IMB)—originally the Foreign Mission Board—in Richmond, Va., sponsors missionaries to the rest of the world.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember one another in prayer; to aid one another in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and Christian courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation and mindful of the rules of our Savior to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this church we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and the principles of God's Word.
